Pie Orders: Your organization needs to determine a pick-up date and time. It is your responsibility to collect, compile and distribute all orders. Pie totals must be called or faxed **at least 2 weeks prior to your pick-up date (earlier if around a major holiday)**. (Prices and selections listed below and subject to change.)

Gift Certificates: We have gift certificates available in two denominations. You can purchase \$20 gift certificates at a cost to you of \$15 per certificate or \$10 gift certificates at a cost to you of \$8.00 per certificate. Gift certificate totals must be called or faxed **at least 1 week prior to your pick-up date**.

Payment: It is your responsibility to collect all cash and checks (made payable to your organization) prior to pick-up. Payment must be made payable to **Just Pies** in one final check or in a combination of cash and one check or major credit card.
